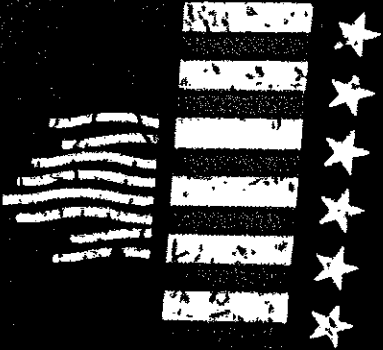

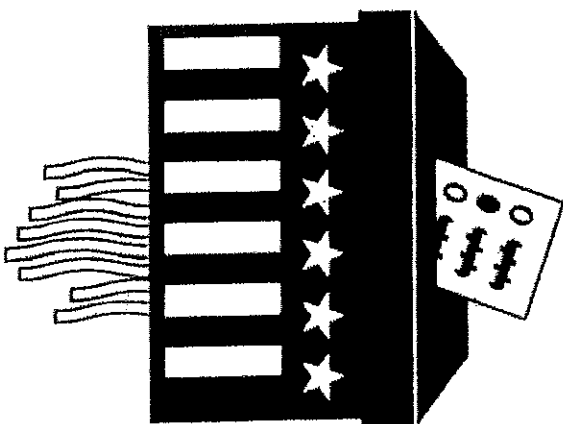

## PROLOGUE

HMM . . .

It was a mystery worthy of master crime writer Raymond Chandler.

And the mystery was this: On November 8, 2016, black Americans did not show up at the polls.

It was like a day of absence.

Of a mostly black district in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, one reporter was told that folks there had virtually boycotted the election because they "simply saw no affirmative reason to vote for Hillary". Some saw her as corrupt; others noted that they had not seen their economic situation improved during the Obama years."

Another journalist concluded that because Hillary Clinton lacked the ability, charisma, or magic to keep Barack Obama's coalition together, "African-American, Latino and younger voters failed to show up at the polls in sufficient numbers." As proof of black people's coolness toward Hillary Clinton, journalists

pointed to the much greater turnout for Barack Obama in 2008 and 2012.

Yes, nationwide black voter turnout had dropped by nearly 17 percent. What's more, less than half of Latino and Asian American voters went to the polls. The tide of black, Latino, and Asian American voters that had carried Obama into the White House in 2008 and kept him there for a second term had visibly ebbed.

But, you see, blacks, Latinos, and Asian Americans did not simply refuse to vote. Republican legislatures and governors had systematically blocked millions from the polls.

Why?  
To survive.

The GOP's overwhelmingly white constituency was becoming an ever smaller share of the voting public and the party wasn't attracting legions of people of color because of its inability to craft policies that speak to an increasingly diverse nation.

Rather than reform—change its ways, its outlook—the GOP decided to disenfranchise—to deprive Democrat-leaning people of their right to vote.

*One Person, No Vote* is the story of these desperate, dastardly, and most undemocratic measures—and the history behind them.

### BUBBLES IN A BAR OF SOAP

THE MILLIONS OF VOTES AND VOTERS THAT DISAP-  
peared in 2016 were a long time in the making.

The drive to disenfranchise black people, in particular, is best understood by going back to strides toward a real democracy: A government, as Abraham Lincoln said in his Gettysburg Address, "of the people, by the people, for the people."

This moment came after the Civil War, during Reconstruction. It brought, among other things, the 1865 Thirteenth Amendment to the US Constitution (slavery abolished), the 1868 Fourteenth Amendment (black citizenship cemented), and the 1870 Fifteenth Amendment (black men gained the national vote). But a more democratic America was anathema to a multitude of white people.

Reconstruction, which ended in 1877, saw scores of black men in the political arena and in government. Black artisans and entrepreneurs, laborers and lawyers, mechanics and ministers

became postmasters, sheriffs, marshals, councilmen, commissioners, state legislators, secretaries of state. A handful were lieutenant governors. More than a dozen served in the US Congress.

And so many did so much good. For example, one black South Carolina legislator remarked, black men helped to craft "the laws relative to finance, the building of penal and charitable institutions, and, greatest of all, the establishment of the public school system." Yet the myth of incompetent, disastrous so-called black rule dominated. Said one newspaper editor in the early 1870s: "No negro is fit to make laws for white people."

"Many Texans refused to accept the fact that the Negro was 'free and equal' and stopped at nothing to prevent him from enjoying civic and political rights."

—Maud Cuney Hare in her biography of her father, Morris Wright Cuney, a leading black Lone Star State activist, entrepreneur, and politician during Reconstruction

After Reconstruction, legions of white people did their utmost to ensure white rule—to keep black men from voting, to prevent black America from having any real political power. (While some black men did hold political office after Reconstruction, the numbers dwindled and dwindled.)

Black voter suppression really ramped up in 1890 when the Magnolia State passed what became known as the Mississippi Plan: a dizzying array of poll taxes; literacy tests; understanding

clauses (which officials used to justify registering some white illiterate people who they claimed understood the information read to them); newfangled voter registration rules; and "good character" clauses. All were racially discriminatory, but they were pitched as simply a way to bring "integrity" to the polls.

Virginia state senator Carter Glass, like many other white politicians, swooned at the thought of bringing the Mississippi Plan to his state. During Virginia's 1901-2 state constitutional convention, Glass championed a plan that would "eliminate the darkey as a political factor in this state in less than five years."

"Will it not be done by fraud and discrimination?" asked a fellow delegate.

"By fraud, no. By discrimination, yes," replied Glass. "Discrimination! Why, that is precisely what we propose. That, exactly, is what this Convention was elected for—to discriminate to the very extremity of permissible action under the limitations of the Federal Constitution, with a view to the elimination of every negro voter who can be gotten rid of, legally, without materially impairing the numerical strength of the white electorate."

But the drive to wipe out the black vote would hurt poor and illiterate white people. And for many of those in power, that was just fine.

For some it was the point. Mississippi's Eaton Bowers, who served in Congress in the early 1900s, later said that his state's new constitution had disenfranchised "the ignorant and vicious white" voter along with black voters. He stated that Mississippi's eligible voters were "now confined to those, and to those alone, who are qualified by

expanding access to the franchise are occurring in Madison, Wisconsin; East Lansing, Michigan; New York City; St. Louis, Missouri; and Macon County, Illinois.

Yet, for all these efforts, there's still work to be done. The lie of rampant voter fraud has embedded itself into the American imagination and has proved resistant to facts, studies, court cases, and reports proving otherwise. As the tentacles of the lie continue to sink deeper and deeper into our democracy, they threaten to choke the very life out of the body politic and, in the end, severely weaken the United States.

Staggering Stats

- In 2018, when it came to Americans eligible to vote...
- Seventy-seven million were not on the voter rolls. This number is more than the total combined population of the largest one hundred cities in America—from New York City to Birmingham—by nearly sixteen million people.
- Over 42 percent of Latino Americans were not registered to vote.
- Close to 43 percent of Asian Americans were not registered to vote.
- Almost 31 percent of black Americans were not registered.
- Only 26 percent of white Americans were not registered.

We're in trouble.

Years of gerrymandering, requiring IDs that only certain people have, illegally purging citizens from the voter rolls, and starving majority-people-of-color precincts of resources so as to

create untenable conditions at the polls have exposed our electoral jugular and made the United States vulnerable to Russian attacks on our democracy. Those assaults played out as seamlessly as if they had been made in the USA and not hatched in the bowels of the Kremlin. But it's not just the Russian attack, as horrific as that is.

Voter suppression has made the US Senate wholly unrepresentative. Take Texas. In 2018, the Lone Star State had two Republican US senators, John Cornyn and Ted Cruz, who have voted overwhelmingly (97 percent and 92.5 percent, respectively) to support Trump's agenda regarding immigration, taxes, banking regulations that strip the requirement to report on discrimination in lending, and other policies. Yet, the senator's voting profile is antithetical to the composition of Texas, where "Latinos make up about 39% of the state's population."

Voter suppression has placed in the presidency a man who is anything but presidential. It has already reshaped the US Supreme Court with the installation of Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh, threatening to undermine the judiciary for decades to come. Thus, when thirty-one states are vying to develop new and more ruthless ways to disenfranchise their populations, and when others are searching desperately for ways to bring millions of citizens into the electorate, we have created a nation where democracy is simultaneously atrophying and growing—depending solely on where one lives.

History makes clear, however, that this is simply not sustainable.

It wasn't sustainable in the antebellum era.

## "A NATIONAL CHAMPION"

IN 2016, ONE IN THIRTEEN BLACK AMERICANS HAD lost their right to vote because of a felony conviction, compared with one in fifty-six non-black voters. The major villain in this set piece is the War on Drugs, which was a targeted hit on black people.

Black people in America do drugs no more than any other racial or ethnic group, yet they are imprisoned for drug charges at almost six times the rate of white people. Hyper-policing in black communities has meant that while "African Americans represent 12.5% of illicit drug users," they are "29% of those arrested for drug offenses and 33% of those incarcerated in state facilities for drug offenses," said a 2015 NAACP fact sheet.

In America, mass incarceration equals mass felony disenfranchisement. With the launch of the War on Drugs, millions of black people were swept into the criminal justice system, many
