

Progress OBJECTIVE(S): Readino Objective 1: Imployement in Mean Points earned on FCAT content areas. Comparison (2)05 to 2006) on the FCAT NRT showed: (Gr.3=increased in 4 strands; dropp ad one point in 3; Gr.4=increased in 4 strands, stayed same in 2; <a> YES Gr.5=increased in all 7 strands; Gr.6=increased in 4 strands, remained same in 3. The total number of mean points assigned to each content strand varies from ⊖ NO FCAT SSS 2005 to FCAT SSS 2006. To compare, calculation was done using percentages. I cross all grades there was a 44% improvement on the strands. Objective I was met. Objective 2: Adequate learning gains made by the lowest quartile students. FLA+ Plan results show 61% made a year's worth of progress. NCLB determined all subgroups riet the reading criteria. Objective 3: Fifty percent of MRE students will make learning gains as determined by State stands rds. FLA+ Plan cite i 63% of MRE's students made a year's worth of progress. DIBELS results also show progress in fluency across all grade levels. in addition, the 2005-06 NCLB Adequate Progress Report showed 79% scoring at or above grade level. Objective 3 was met. Objective 4: Fifty percent or more of students in each grade (K through 2) will score above the 51st percentile on respective State testing. Sluty-nine (69%) percent of kindergartners, 58% of first graders, and 63% of second graders scored above the 51st percentile. Objective 4 was met. Objective 5: Tuto ial programs implemented for any K-6 student needing intensive reading Instruction. Tutorial programs were implemented at the start of the school term (2005-06) and continued to its end. Programs were in addition to regular blocked sessions and included Summer Reading Camp, ESE Summer School, Direct Instruction, extra reading is b sessions, before school tutoring, and mentoring. Objective 5 was met.

Objective 1: Fift / percent (50%) of the AYP subgroups, Students with Disabilities and YES Economically Disadvantaged, will score at or above grade level as reported on the 2006 Adequal a Yearly Progress (AYP) Report. The 2006 AYP results show 58% of Students with Disabilities and 69% of the O NO Economically Disadvantaged scored at or above grade level. Objective 1 was met. Objective 2: Seventy percent (70%) of all MRE students will make adequate learning gains as meas ared by State standards. According to I'L A+ Plan 74% of students made a year's worth of progress. Objective 2 was met. Objective 3: Improvement in the mean points achieved on the content strands. On FCAT Math SSS, comparison of mean points on the content strands showed varying improvement from grade level to grade level. Grade 3 out of 5 strands had improvement in one; Grade 4 had 4 areas increasing; Grade 5 had 2; Grade 6 had one. Of the 5: trands on the FCAT NRT, Grade 3 had improvement in 2; Grade 4 increased in 4 but of 5; Grade 5 improved in 4 of 5; Grade 6 upped in 2. According to this informs tion, Objective 3 was met. Objective 4: Ade quate learning gains by 50% of lowest quartile students. FL A+ Plan sho wed 74% of MRE's students made a year's worth of progress—an increase of 24% over the 2005 percentage. Character Education is to ught in classrooms; guidance counseior conducts additional activities at each grade level. MRE has an in-School Suspension program. There were no referrals for behavior of a serious nature, and referrals in general saw a significant reduction from previous years. Objective I was met. The above-named workshops were part of the School-wide Professional Development System Plan. Objective I wa: met. Individual Professional Development Plans (IPDP) formed in August 2005 were completed by figuity at year's end and reviewed by administration.
