## (1) Innovation Fair Matchmaker Grants – Funding: \$120,000

The purpose of this project is to develop career academies/innovative programs using a partnership and mentoring model between current successful career academies and new applicants. These career academies are research-based programs that incorporate rigorous standards with industry and business relevancy. Funds must be used to establish K12 academies that integrate academic and career curriculum through a career-based theme. These programs must focus on innovative approaches to improve academic achievement and prepare students for collegiate or vocational careers. Future funding for sustainability will come from other grant opportunities, Perkins grant funding, FTE funding, and partnership funding.

The Clay County School District is eligible for three grants of \$40,000 each to establish:

Future Educators Academy at Keystone Heights High School – Broward County (mentor)

Agriscience Academy at Keystone Heights High School – Manatee County (mentor)

Law and Government Academy at Clay High School – Volusia County (mentor)
