Dear Parent/Guardian:

This letter is to inform you that Clay County Local Educational Agency (LEA) has been identified as a LEA in corrective action based on the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. This means that the LEA did not meet one or more of the state academic achievement criteria, or Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) targets, in reading, writing, mathematics, and/or graduation rate for four or more consecutive years. Adequate Yearly Progress measures the performance of all students and specific student groups based on race/ethnicity, free and reduced price lunch status, disability, and English proficiency.

To make AYP, a certain percentage of students in each group must score at grade level, or be proficient, on the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test® (FCAT)/FCAT 2.0 in reading, writing, and mathematics. If one student group is not proficient, the entire LEA does not meet the AYP requirements. This does not mean the LEA is failing, it means that certain areas need improvement.

The table below shows the percentage of proficient students in your LEA compared to other students in the state.
