D5 - Public Hearing to Approve as Advertised Adoption of K-5 English Language Arts, K-4 Mathematics Intervention, and 9-12 Personal Financial Literacy and Money Management

### Description

On January 3rd, the Pre-selection Adoption Committees which included teacher representatives from each impacted subject area and parents vetted materials for the considered courses using a comprehensive rubric that aligned curricula to materials for K-5 English Language Arts (ELA), K-4 Mathematics Intervention, and 9-12 Personal Finance and Money Management (PFIN). The committees thoroughly reviewed all available curriculum options from the state adoption list. The teams worked to apply rigorous alignment criteria using evaluation tools provided by the Instructional Resources Department and District Curriculum Specialists to each selection to determine the top products that would best meet the needs of the students of Clay County. To finalize the vetting process, all impacted teachers were asked to provide feedback about the top choices and the ability of each to meet the needs of their students. All feedback from specialists, coaches, teachers, and parents were then provided to the District Committee for their review and recommendation.

The top products selected for each subject are posted on the Instructional Resources page of the District's website. The public is encouraged to view the products and express their individual comments and/or concerns about each one. Florida State Statute 1006.283 requires an open, noticed school board hearing to receive public comment on the recommended instructional materials. The publication of notice allows CCDS to meet this requirement

### Gap Analysis

K-5 English Language Arts materials were previously adopted in 2020. Section (s.) 1001.215, Florida Statutes (F.S.), Just Read, Florida! Office, Requires the primary instructional strategy for teaching word reading to be phonics instruction for decoding and encoding. Identified reading instructional and intervention programs for foundational skills may not include strategies that employ the three-cueing system model of reading or visual memory as a basis for teaching word reading. Such programs may include visual information and strategies that improve background and experiential knowledge, add context and increase oral language and vocabulary to support comprehension, but may not be used to teach word reading. As a result of these provisions, the Commissioner has found that the K-12 ELA adoption cycle requires more frequent revisions than envisioned in the 2020-2021 adoption cycle. House Bill 7039 from the 2023 legislative session requires a state examined and approved list of mathematics intervention programs, curricula and high-quality supplemental materials that may be used to improve a student's mathematics deficiencies. Senate Bill 1054 from 2022 legislative session amended Sections (s.) 1003.41 and 1003.4282, Florida Statutes (F.S.) requiring that students entering grade 9 in the 2023-2024 school year and thereafter earn one-half credit in personal financial literacy and money management. As such, the Department determined that requirements for courses that meet this statute are not reflected in currently adopted materials from the 2022-2023 social studies instructional materials adoption.

### **Previous Outcomes**

Statute requires a district to adopt within five years of the State's adoption year. F.S. 1006.283 Requires a public hearing to be posted in a publication 20 calendar days prior to the event in order for the public to be made fully aware of the District's intentions.

### **Expected Outcomes**

These materials would provide the teachers of Clay County current, quality, and aligned materials to enable them the ability to deliver and plan engaging lessons, and provide students with the resources to maximize learning and increase student outcomes.

# February 25, 2025 - School Board Workshop

**Date**: Feb 25 2025 (9:05 a.m.)

Invocation (Erin Skkipper)

**Call to Order** (Present: Erin Skipper, District 1; Robert Alvero, District 2; Beth Clark, District 3, Michele Hanson, District 4; Ashley Gilhousen, District 5; and Superintendent David S. Broskie)

#### Workshop Items

1. Review of Policy Development - Students

#### Minutes:

Lisa Whitman and Tom Wittmer, Esq. Neola, reviewed the draft proposed policies - 5000 (students).

Discussion on draft proposed policies included:

- <u>5136 Wireless Communication Devices</u> The board engaged in a comprehensive discussion of students' cell phone use including after-school use, phones on silent vs. powered off, and lunchtime use for high school students. There was board consensus to add Neola option A back into the WCD policy, requiring that phones be powered off and put away with the exception of silencing phones during afterschool activities, on buses, or during lunch (lunch pertains to high school students only). Mrs. Hanson noted the support received from teachers re keeping cell phones out of the classrooms.
- 5200 Attendance Mrs. Hanson requested clarification on the omission of administrative procedures proposed in Neola
  template, stating that teachers are concerned with varying procedures and their inability to track 125+ students on a daily
  basis. Mrs. Gilhousen noted the robocalls generated to assist with attendance issues. Mr. Broskie advised the proposed
  procedures were not used because there is a 3-tier administrative procedure that the district and school board attorney have
  developed together to address truancy. These procedures will be outlined in detail in the Administrative Procedures section
  when crafted.
- <u>5230 Late Arrival and Early Dismissal</u> Mr. Broskie clarified that certain language was stricken as the district does not become involved in custody conflicts.
- 5320 Immunization and Health Examination Mrs. Skipper advised that the state of Florida allows religious and philosophical
  exemptions for immunization requirements. Language will be added to this proposed policy to clarify that the State of Florida
  may provide the exemption and CCDS will accept the official Department of Health Forms provided. This change will also be
  included in the enrollment policy.
- <u>5330 Use of Medications</u> brief notation of a change of practice, related to statute, that allows students to carry headache medication.
- 5420 Reporting Student Progress Mrs. Hanson noted a need to make clarifications re how student progress is reported to
  parents. Mr. Broskie noted that information is contained in the Student Progression Plan. Mrs. Hanson would like this
  information made more accessible and less complicated for parents. Mr. Broskie advised that teachers should be reporting
  student deficiencies along the way and there is a procedure in place for engaging parents in this process. Mrs. Hanson
  proposed a future forum with teachers and parents to help determine the right direction for implementing a consistent standard
  across the board.
- <u>5511 Dress and Grooming</u> The helpfulness of a visual addressing appropriate dress would be posted in schools was suggested. Discussion also included how to define "inappropriate" and how dress code violations are addressed. Re ceremonies and extra-curricular events, coaches, principals, and sponsors can provide attire quidelines.
- <u>5512 Smoking and Tobacco</u> Mrs. Hanson stressed the need for consistent, locktight procedures and inquired if our law partners, Orange Park Police Department, Green Cove Springs Police Department, and Clay County Sheriffs Office are all apprised of the same procedures. Mr. Broskie advised the district can coordinate with all law enforcement partners to ensure they have the procedures.
- <u>5515 Use of Motor Vehicles</u> Mr. Broskie directed the addition of a statement that the board will not be responsible for motor vehicles that are lost, stolen or damaged, or subject to search and seizure as outlined in policy.

Mrs. Hanson has been visiting schools and engaging in discussion with teachers. She recommends an outside survey of the teachers to determine what is really important to them. She want to foster greater connection to the teachers. Mrs. Gilhousen indicated that one option could be a School Board teachers' survey, with the information being sent to the school board chair, who can report the information to the board at a workshop. She believes the resounding theme being expressed and shared is the need for parent engagement with their kids. The recent Safety and Security seminar provided a great starting point to have conversations because parents are the primary educators of children and that important relationship can not be replaced.

Mrs. Skipper reflected on the State of Schools address and advised that she has been going into the community and speaking with clubs and organizations, on behalf of the accomplishments of the board and district, on what has been done to further student success. She noted the specific allocation of some funding and the many moving parts to the district, appreciating the time spent with community members and leaders. She appreciated the new concession stand and indicated her support for agriculture, anticipating students being active participants in the upcoming Clay County Agricultural Fair.

C3 - Proposed Supplement Allocations for 2025-2026

#### Description

Supplemental allocations are proposed each April for the upcoming school year. Such allocations are intended to support student needs in both academic and athletic settings. Since supplemental positions require additional responsibilities outside of an employee's contracted position and/or responsibilities outside of an employee's contracted work hours, they receive compensation beyond their regular salary. The Board and Clay County Education Association (CCEA) agreed to increase the base multiplier from \$35,000 to \$37,000 at a total increase cost of \$448,403.00. This was the first increase since the 2008-2009 school year.

#### Gap Analysis

District funded portion of the supplement will be \$3,236,375.00. Federal funded portion of the supplement increase will be \$295,199.00. The total supplement cost is \$3,531,574.00. The following list comprises various transactions that require the recommendation of the Superintendent and the approval of the School Board. The supplemental list includes academic and athletic supplements.

#### **Previous Outcomes**

The Board approves the supplement recommendations from the Superintendent.

#### **Expected Outcomes**

Supplements will be distributed sufficiently to meet the needs of the various schools and district departments.

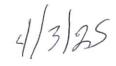

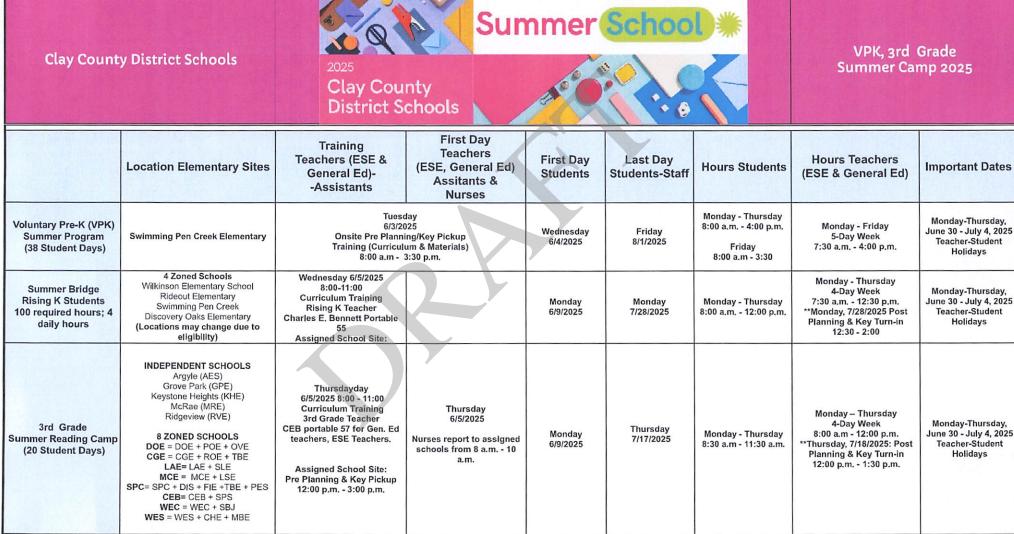

#### CONTRACT REVIEW PROCESS FOR "ALL" CONTRACTS

A contract is defined as an agreement between two or more parties that is intended to have legal effect. This may include MOUs, Interlocal Agreements, Service Agreements and Contracts. Contracts document the mutual understanding between the parties as to the terms and conditions of their agreement, contain mutual obligations, and clearly state the agreement's consideration. The term consideration includes the cost of the services and/or products to be provided by second party (vendor or service provider) and any non-monetary performance. No school, department, or other organizational unit has authority to contract in its own name. All Board contracts must be made in the legal name of the Board, "The School Board of Clay County, Florida". The School or Department may extend this name to include the school or department as follows, "The School Board of Clay County, Florida o/b/o \_\_\_\_\_ (insert the school or department name)" where o/b/o means "on behalf of".

All contracts shall be reviewed and approved by the School Board Attorney and/or the Supervisor of Purchasing to ensure legality, compliance with Board policy, and to ensure the Board interests are protected before the authorized signatory may execute the contract.

All contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more shall be authorized by the Board at a regular or special meeting and signed by the Board Chairman. All approved contracts having a value of less than \$100,000 may be executed by the Superintendent or appropriate District administrator based on the value of the contract.

- 1. All approved contracts having a value of \$50,000 or more, but less than \$100,000 shall be signed by the Superintendent, or the person who has been designated, in writing by the Superintendent, as the Superintendent's Designee at the time of the contract signing. All contracts executed pursuant to this subparagraph shall be reported to the School Board in a separate entry as part of the monthly financial report.
- 2. All approved contracts having a value of \$25,000 or more, but less than \$50,000, shall be signed by the Superintendent, or the Assistant Superintendent for Business Affairs.
- 3. All approved contracts having a value of less than \$25,000 and contracts of any value described in Board Authorized Contracts above that are exempt from the requirement for Board approval, may be signed by the Superintendent, or the Assistant Superintendent for their Division, or Chief Officers, or Directors, or Principals.
- 4. The Superintendent is authorized to approve contract amendments or change orders for the purchase of commodities and services up to the amount of ten (10) percent or \$50,000, whichever is less, of the original contract amount that was previously approved by the Board.

Employees who enter into agreements without authority may be personally liable for such agreements, whether oral or written.

<u>Step 1</u>: Contract Initiator and Vendor prepare draft contract (School Board Attorney Office (SBAO) Template Contracts available on SBAO webpage are <u>strongly</u> encouraged)

Step 2: Complete Contract Review Form, attach Required Documents to include the UNSIGNED Contract by the District / School.

For Contracts using Budgeted Funds or For No Cost / Master (County Wide) Contracts: Initiator submits Contract Review Package to Purchasing Department - See Step 3

For Contracts using Internal Funds Individual to each School: Initiator submits Contract Review Package direct to SBAO - See Step 4



Step 3: If Funded by Budgeted Funds, submit the Contract Review Package to the Purchasing Department.
Purchasing will begin the contract review process and submit the contract to the SBAO for review. SBAO may reach out to Initiator and/or other Departments (Risk, IT,) with questions or concerns and will assist with contract revisions. SBAO will send the Contract Review Package back to the Purchasing Department for final processing and the return to Initiator.

Purchasing will log "District" Contracts (Cost/No Cost) on Contract Review Log and save copy of the Contract Review Package PLUS the Final Signed Contract you've return to Purchasing in the Contract Review Team Drive.

<u>Step 4</u>: If Funded by Internal Account (IA), submit the Contract Review Package directly to SBAO.

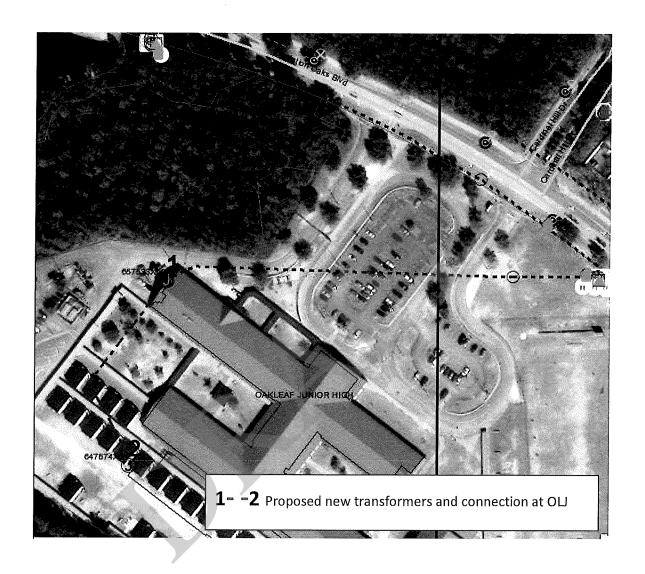

#### CONTRACT REVIEW PROCESS FOR "ALL" CONTRACTS

A contract is defined as an agreement between two or more parties that is intended to have legal effect. This may include MOUs, Interlocal Agreements, Service Agreements and Contracts. Contracts document the mutual understanding between the parties as to the terms and conditions of their agreement, contain mutual obligations, and clearly state the agreement's consideration. The term consideration includes the cost of the services and/or products to be provided by second party (vendor or service provider) and any non-monetary performance. No school, department, or other organizational unit has authority to contract in its own name. All Board contracts must be made in the legal name of the Board, "The School Board of Clay County, Florida". The School or Department may extend this name to include the school or department as follows, "The School Board of Clay County, Florida o/b/o \_\_\_\_\_\_ (insert the school or department name)" where o/b/o means "on behalf of".

All contracts shall be reviewed and approved by the School Board Attorney and/or the Supervisor of Purchasing to ensure legality, compliance with Board policy, and to ensure the Board interests are protected before the authorized signatory may execute the contract.

All contracts having a value of \$100,000 or more shall be authorized by the Board at a regular or special meeting and signed by the Board Chairman. All approved contracts having a value of less than \$100,000 may be executed by the Superintendent or appropriate District administrator based on the value of the contract.

- 1. All approved contracts having a value of \$50,000 or more, but less than \$100,000 shall be signed by the Superintendent, or the person who has been designated, in writing by the Superintendent, as the Superintendent's Designee at the time of the contract signing. All contracts executed pursuant to this subparagraph shall be reported to the School Board in a separate entry as part of the monthly financial report.
- 2. All approved contracts having a value of \$25,000 or more, but less than \$50,000, shall be signed by the Superintendent, or the Assistant Superintendent for Business Affairs.
- 3. All approved contracts having a value of less than \$25,000 and contracts of any value described in Board Authorized Contracts above that are exempt from the requirement for Board approval, may be signed by the Superintendent, or the Assistant Superintendent for their Division, or Chief Officers, or Directors, or Principals.
- 4. The Superintendent is authorized to approve contract amendments or change orders for the purchase of commodities and services up to the amount of ten (10) percent or \$50,000, whichever is less, of the original contract amount that was previously approved by the Board.

Employees who enter into agreements without authority may be personally liable for such agreements, whether oral or written.
