# SESIR-School Environmental Safety Incident Reporting

## Office of Safe Schools

The Office of Safe Schools serves as a central repository for best practices, training standards and compliance oversight in all matters regarding school safety and security. Their mission is to support districts in providing a safe learning environment for students and educators.

They implement and manage how SESIR incidents are defined and how they should be reported.

Reporting rules are established on both how it is reported to the Office of Safe Schools and to Law Enforcement,



## SESIR - Reporting rules from the Office of Safe Schools

[Rule 6A-1.0017, Florida Administrative Code](#) - Continually Evolving Document - Newest Update went into effect on August 22, 2023

(2) Definitions.

(b) “**Law enforcement action**” means that official action was taken by a School Resource Officer (SRO) or local law enforcement officer in response to a SESIR incident, including but not limited to: an arrest, referral to a civil citation or similar prearrest diversion program authorized by Section 985.12, F.S., or initiation of an involuntary examination authorized by Section 394.463, F.S.

(f) “**Reported to law enforcement**” means that school district or charter school staff communicated with a School Resource Officer (SRO) or other law enforcement official about an incident. **Reporting to law enforcement may not always result in law enforcement action being taken.**



## SESIR Defined Events - These events must be reported as SESIR Events

- Alcohol
- Aggravated Battery
- Arson
- Burglary
- Criminal Mischief
- Disruption on Campus-Major
- Drug Sale/Distribution
- Drug Use/Possession
- Fighting\*\*\*
- Grand Theft
- Hazing
- Homicide
- Kidnapping
- Other Major
- Robbery
- Sexual Assault
- Sexual Battery
- Sexual Offenses Other
- Simple Battery
- Threat/Intimidation
- Trespassing
- Weapons Possession

Do NOT require report to Law Enforcement

- Bullying
- Harassment
- Sexual Harassment
- Tobacco

However, these can be reported to Law Enforcement



## SESIR - Reporting rules from the Office of Safe Schools

In addition, administrative code dictates for a given event only one violation be coded, and for a given event all students should be added to that incident.

5.(a) SESIR is an incident-based reporting system, which means that a single incident is reported, even where there are multiple offenders or victims, or multiple incidents that occur within one episode.

1. If there is more than one incident in a single episode, districts are required to report only one incident based upon rank order level, beginning with incidents that are classified as Level I.

## Synergy and SESIR

2021-2022 was the first year we used Synergy as our Student Information System.

The priorities at the time were enrollment, schedules, attendance, FTE, and student grades and credits.

In Synergy there are 9 places where it can be found either to Document, Report to, Referral to or Notify Law Enforcement.

When the data gets reported to the Office of Safe Schools only 1 of those 9 places inputs the data to the correct line to be submitted.

During the 2022 -2023 school year there was an unprecedented update released on January 17th, 2023 that was to be implemented immediately.

All departments were made aware of the changes and all were able to implement the new changes within a very short period of time.
