

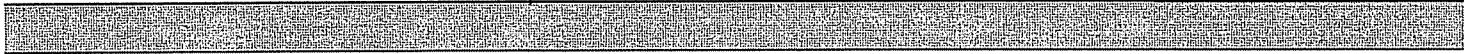

While assigned to Orange Park High School, Ted Jahns, Computer teacher and IT Specialist contacted me. Ted stated that after an inventory of his classroom, Vocational room 139, he noticed an entire computer missing.

Ted states that there was no forced entry into his room and nothing else was missing. Ted Jahns and Ray Dukes (Assistant Principal in charge of property) did a school search to see if the computer had been moved to another room. Ted stated it was odd that someone took the entire computer: Mouse, keyboard, monitor and tower, plus all related cables.

Ted stated this usually only happens when a computer is moved to another classroom. At this point the computer has not turned up and no one has come forward to say it is in his or her classroom. The report was delayed until all means of locating the computer were exhausted.

This case is pending until further information can be obtained

On 04-10-2006 at approximately 1015 hours I responded to Lake Asbury Junior High School in regards to a theft of computers investigation.

On arrival I made contact with Vice Principal Ozro May at the main office of the school. Mr. May informed me that sometime after school on 04-07-2006 and this date someone removed four (4) Dell brand hard drive towers from teacher Mrs. Cowardin's portable room. He told me that at approximately 0830 hours Mrs. Cowardin told him that someone entered her locked building and removed the computers. He stated that no other portable buildings to the school appeared to have been entered by the unknown suspect(s). Mr. May told me that at the start of school that he placed Mrs. Cowardin's class in the computer lab so as not to disturb the crime scene. He stated that on Saturday the school's softball field was being used by the PAL (Police Athletic League) and on Sunday morning that the cafeteria was used by the Abundant Life Church for services. He stated that on his investigation he noticed a set of tire tracks leading to the next portable building which was to the rear property line of the school.

On investigation Mr. May directed me to Mrs. Cowardin's portable building #423 and unlocked the front door. During this time he informed me that two hard drive towers had been removed from the rear table in the room. I observed that a monitor was laying on the floor next to the table and that the keyboards and another monitor laying disturbed on the top of the table. Mr. May then informed me that a hard drive was removed from a television stand next to the teacher's desk with the monitor and keyboard remaining. I observed that the connections and wires to the computer were disturbed with a speaker laying on the floor. On the teacher's desk it was determined that a hard drive and a 15" inch flat screen monitor was removed. I observed a flat head screwdriver laying on the top of a desk caddy which was next to the teacher's desk near the rear door. I observed that the handle to the screwdriver was covered with sand grains. Upon a check of the rear door I observed pry marks near the door lock. It appeared the mark was made with a flat head screwdriver or similar object with an approximate 1/4" wide blade. It appeared the suspect(s) pried the lock away from the frame which caused the wood frame to crack in the area of the lock's bolt mechanism. Upon a check of the outside area around the portable I did not observe any suspect(s) shoe/footprints in the dirt area. It appeared that the rainfall on the night of 04-08-2006 had destroyed any shoe impressions as the area around the rear door was surrounded with dirt. Upon a check of the windows to the portable I observed them to be locked with no sign of force entry. It was determined that the tire tracks that Mr. May informed me of were made by a teacher on Sunday afternoon when she parked next to her portable.

I made contact with Sgt. D. Lee #717 and informed him of the burglary at this time. I was advised that an evidence technician and investigator would be requested to respond. Upon investigator C. Rosepiller's arrival, I informed him of the investigation at this time. Deputy E. Howell #6375 responded to process the scene for evidence. I informed him of the screwdriver that was located on the desk caddy. I obtained a sworn written statement from Mrs. Cowardin as well as the serial numbers from Mr. May on the computer hard drives. I was advised by Mr. May that the estimated value of the stolen items was \$3700.00 dollars. I made contact with NCIC/FCIC operator Doyle and the computer hard drives were entered into the system as stolen. Mr. May could not provide me the serial numbers to the flats screen monitor at this time. I advised Mr. May of crime preventive tips including better door lock plates on the older portable rooms. I further provided him with victim rights information and an assigned case number.

On 03/03/06 at 1357 hours, I made contact with Lenora Paulk (involved other) who is the principal at Swimming Pen Creek Elementary. She advised me that she believed that one of her custodians stole a computer from the school. She stated that they just got a new shipment of Dell computers in and when they were getting ready to set them up found that one had been taken. Several days later they started setting them up and when one was plugged in a login screen with the name "James" appeared. The involved other stated that she had two custodians with the name James.

Upon interviewing James Richburg III (offender) post Miranda he confessed to taking the computer home and bringing it back to the school. The offender stated that when he was cleaning the room that the computers were in he opened one of the boxes and placed the cpu tower in a trash bag. He then stated that he threw the box in the trash and carried the computer home in a trash bag. The offender then stated that when he got home he was unable to login to the computer due to it being programmed for the school. Once he realized he could not use he brought the computer back to the school in a trash bag and put it back hoping no one would notice. Clay County School Board computer technicians were able to pull up that the offender attempted to login fifteen times.

The offenders confession was recorded by voice recorder. After completing the investigation the Clay County School Board did not want to persue charges, but wanted to handle it themselves.

This case is exceptionally cleared victim uncooperative.

On 04-17-2006 at approximately 1015 hours I responded to Tynes Elementary School in regards to a theft of computers investigation.

On arrival I made contact with Assistant Principal Kim Morrison at the main office of the school. Mrs. Morrison informed me that sometime after school on 04-13-2006 and this date someone removed an Apple brand IMAC Model 6498 hard drive tower, keyboard and computer flat screen from teacher Mr. James Bujold's portable room. She told me that at approximately 0830 hours Mr. Bujold told her that someone entered his locked building and removed the computer. She stated that no other portable buildings to the school appeared to have been entered by the unknown suspect(s). Mrs. Morrison told me that at the start of school that she placed Mr. Bujold class in another room so as not to disturb the crime scene. She stated that portable #22 across from Mr. Bujold's room had the window screen removed from one of the front windows however it did not appear that entry had been gained to that portable. Contact was made with teacher Mr. Steven Hermes and he advised that on 04-16-2006 at approximately 1100 hours that he did not see the window screen laying on the steps to portable # 22 on his arrival on the property yesterday.

On investigation Mrs. Morrison directed me to Mr. Bujold's portable building #23. During this time she informed me that the hard drive tower/chassis had been removed from the table next to the teacher's desk. I observed that the printer on this desk still remained along with the printer cord connection. I observed an empty space on the desk at this time. I further observed several items of paper and a compact disc case laying on the floor next to the desk along with a mouse pad. Mr. Bujold informed me that the items had been disturbed by the unknown suspect(s). He further told me that a plastic Easter egg which had contained candy had been removed from his desk and left on the floor near his desk. I observed that the egg did not contain any candy at this time. Upon a check of the side door I observed fresh pry marks near the door lock. It appeared the mark was made with a flat head screwdriver or similar object with an approximate 1/4" wide blade. It appeared the suspect(s) pried the door away from the frame to gain access into the room. Upon a check of the outside area around the portable I did not observe any suspect(s) shoe/footprints in the dirt area. Upon a check of the windows to the portable I observed two windows next to the side door were unlocked and the screens missing from the windows. I processed the exterior surface of the side door to the portable with black powder for suspect(s) latent prints with negative results. I then processed the table that contained the computer for latent prints with no usable prints being obtained. I collect the plastic egg, compact disc case, a paper on the floor and a mouse pad laying on the floor along with the printer connection cord to be submitted as evidence for processing. I processed the interior and exterior surfaces of the unlocked side windows for latent prints with negative results. I then processed the window screen and window to portable #23 for latent prints with negative results. I conducted a check around this portable for usable physical evidence with negative results.

I made contact with Sgt. M. Collins #732 and informed him of the burglary at this time. I was advised by Mrs. Morrison that the estimated value of the stolen items was \$1300.00 dollars. I obtained the serial numbers from Mrs. Morrison on the computer hard drive. I made contact with NCIC/FCIC operator Blair #6309 and the computer hard drive was entered into the system as stolen. Mrs. Morrison could not provide me the serial numbers to the flats screen monitor at this time. I advised Mrs. Morrison of crime preventive tips including better door lock plates on the older portable rooms. I further provided her with victim rights information and an assigned case number.
