### The Florida Virtual Academy at Clay County

Summary of application by Sandra Emery, Community Representative School District of Clay County Charter School Review Committee

The Florida Virtual Academy at Clay County has submitted a complete and comprehensive charter school application. The application supports the Digital Learning Act which requires school districts to offer multiple opportunities for participation in part-time and full-time K-12 virtual instruction. From the mission statement, which is supported throughout the application, to the financial assurances, the application is sound.

Notable strengths are a contract for services with K<sup>12</sup> Florida Inc., an approved educational service provider with a history of academic success, family support teams and comprehensive teacher training. In addition, an intervention team will review every student 20 days into the program and every 30 days after to facilitate academic success.

The Florida Virtual Academy of Clay County, in coordination with the School District of Clay County, will need to design and implement a media campaign to inform parents of the virtual educational opportunities for students in the district. The campaign should outline the differences between the charter school and virtual education currently being offered through Clay Virtual and Florida Virtual School. Such a campaign will decrease parental confusion that is sure to occur with multiple virtual educational opportunities and allow parents to select the best instructional program based on the academic need of each child.

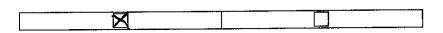
